






WFBF Annual Meeting Delegates

County Ag in the Classroom Update

The Iowa County Ag in the Classroom program has experienced a lot of excitement over the past few months. Read more about the events below and take note of activities coming up.

Time for Cranberries School Visit



In November, the Mineral Point Elementary School welcomed this year's Ag in the Classroom book of the year 'Time for Cranberries" author Lisl Detlefsen. Lisl spent the entire day with students and staff sharing her experiences of living on a cranberry marsh in Wisconsin Rapids and how she connects her personal life to her



She spent time with students in grades second through fifth discussing more of the writing process and allowed time

for students to explore fictional writing while basing it on an actual event that has happened in their lives.

After contacting Ocean Spray and the Wisconsin Cranberry Growers Association, all students and staff members received individual packets of Craisins as well as cranberry brochures, recipes and an activity booklet. A fun day was had by all.

Essay Contest

Speaking of cranberries, this year's essay contest topic is 'Tell us about cranberry production in Wisconsin during one of the four seasons.' This topic is linked with this year's book of the year "Time for Cranberries." Accompanying lessons and activities are available within an educator's guide for teachers, students and volunteers to use in promoting and preparing essays. Each area school in Iowa County has or will be receiving a copy of the book and resources.

Essay submissions must be 100- to 300-words in length and will be judged on content, grammar, spelling and neatness. All fourth and fifth grade students are encouraged to apply. A state winner will be selected from nine district winners in May by the WFBF Promotion and Education Committee. Each district winner will receive a classroom presentation in May for their homeroom or class. All essay submissions for the annual Ag in the Classroom essay contest must be mailed to Krista Dolan by **April 1.**

New State Symbol Proposal



Over the last few months, fourth grade students at Mineral Point Elementary School have been busy gathering data and collecting information on proposing a new state symbol. Fourth grade students start the year learning about the many state symbols of Wisconsin. These state symbols showcase the different areas, cultural traditions and successful industries Wisconsin has to offer.

This year, students took it one step further by researching, selecting and presenting ideas for a possible new Wisconsin state symbol. As researching began, students were shocked to find out that Wisconsin does not have a state dairy product. Quite quickly, the fourth grade students proposed the idea of selecting CHEESE to be Wisconsin's newest state symbol.



Six fourth-grade students: Masson Mattison, Olivia Wilson, Ellie Robinson, Colton Dochnahl, Eli Lindsey and London Kittleson worked together to create a proposal on behalf of the fourth grade class. Students and teachers met with Senator Howard Marklein and Representative Todd Novak to present their strong proposal.



Both elected officials enjoyed the presentation and have begun the first steps to introduce it as a bill. Even more exciting, NBC15 Madison picked up the story and traveled to Mineral Point to interview the students about the proposal. The story was shared on the evening news and has already made quite the impression on the local and state levels.

The fourth grade students and teachers plan to meet again with the elected officials on their annual field trip to the Capitol this March to hear more about the status of their proposal.

Ag Literacy

Once again, county Farm Bureau members will be organizing several literacy events around the county this spring. Members will work with students and children on promoting and exploring Wisconsin agriculture. In one session, young children will have fun learning all about how a peanut butter and jelly sandwich is made.
