



# **Wood County Farm Bureau Offers Scholarship**

### Scholarship guidelines:

- 1. An applicant must hold a current Farm Bureau membership, or have parent or legal guardian that is a current member to receive a scholarship.
- 2. The applicant or their parent or legal guardian must be a member of Farm Bureau as of April 30 of the year prior to applying for the scholarship.
- 3. A total of \$2,000 will be divided among two to four applicants at the discretion of the scholarship committee, with no more than \$500 awarded to one applicant.
- 4. The application must be complete, including a reference, letter of recommendation and essay in order to be eligible.
- 5. In case the recipient does not enroll the scholarship may be awarded to an alternate.
- 6. Payment of scholarship award will be made by the Wood County Farm Bureau upon receiving tuition receipt.
- 7. Recipients will be notified by **April 15.**
- 8. The applicant is strongly encouraged to volunteer in the Wood County Farm Bureau ice cream stand at the Central Wisconsin State Fair.
- 9. The applicant is required to write a 300- to 500-word essay on 'The Value of Wisconsin Farm Bureau.'
