
Taylor County YFA members connected at the YFA Friday night Bumblefest concert. Plenty of networking opportunities were present for YFA members during the entire conference!

While growing up I always wanted to be a city kid. I wanted to come home from school and be able to watch TV, play games and hang out with my family. Instead, I had to go out to the barn in the morning before I went to school and as soon as we got home from school. I will

admit I did get to spend time with my family... but I also worked my little nine-year-old butt off. I was the farm kid who said I would never be a farmer when I grew up and I wouldn't make my kids have chores! Boy, do things change!

Now I am the blessed mother of three boys. Believe it or not, Ryan and I do not assign chores to our boys every day. When we are a little behind, or need some help we do call upon the boys to come out and help with chores. For the most part the boys are free to play and imagine whatever their little brains can come up with. We do have a few rules: 1) you have to pick up what you drag out; 2) you have to play outside while we are outside and 3) everyone plays together or no one plays. I do feel bad for the boys sometimes when they come home and don't want to go outside, but I really don't want to clean up the mess I will have if they are allowed to be inside by themselves.

Traits of High Profit Feeder Calves, Farmer and Cattle Friendly Facilities Highlight UW-Extension Cattle Feeders Clinics

In the last few years, cattle feeders have witnessed record high commodity cattle prices as well as continued volatility in the grain markets. Wisconsin cattle feeders who are seeking information on traits that high profit feeder calves have or are interested in improving their cattle housing and feed storage, handling and feeding facilities should attend this year's cattle feeder clinics. This workshop series is partially funded by a grant from the USDA Risk Management Agency.



Taylor County YFA Members Compete in WFBF's YFA Contests


