Further, we continue to challenge the Environmental Protection Agency and its unwarranted consideration of reducing the Renewable Fuels Standard production goals. Few programs have had a greater impact on meeting this country's energy independence, job growth and farmers' balance sheets.

There will always be more issues and you can be assured Farm Bureau will be part of extending your voice when agriculture needs to be heard.
