

Policies Approved at Annual Meeting

Jefferson County Farm Bureau voting members were presented the following policies at the annual meeting. Each of these policy measures will be passed on to the WFBF Policy Development Committee for potential consideration at the state delegate floor. Below you will find each of the state resolutions approved by our county voting members.

1. DNR Stewardship Program should be changed to allow for permanent conservation of agricultural land used for agricultural purposes.
2. We support the agricultural cleanup program with funds not to be allocated to other purposes. Total funds should be capped at a sufficiently large amount and fees only levied to keep the fund full.
3. Water rights are a very important part of Wisconsin agriculture. We need to be sure that the water laws of this state protect its agriculture interests, thus allowing proper drainage and means of discharge maintained. Urbanization should not be able to concrete, or blacktop where it would interfere with the natural flow of water. We need to encourage state and counties to maintain and support the historic drainage concept.
4. Under the new state wetland legislation, mitigation of wetlands is allowed giving farmers more options as they work

to upgrade their farm drainage systems. However under federal law and the farm bill, farmers may be in violation of the swamp buster provisions and in turn could have to forfeit federal farm payments.

Therefore, be it resolved, that Farm Bureau will work to make the new Farm Bill portion of swamp buster more compatible to Wisconsin law, allowing mitigation without being in violation and causing forfeiture of funds.

5. We support legislative reform of the Public Service Commission (PSC) to make it more responsive to consumers, including code specifically mandating that the PSC is responsible for the health and safety of consumers as it relates to the industries they regulate.
6. We support requiring each wind turbine to comply with current electrical codes, especially the National Electrical Safety Code and the IEEE 519 to avoid having wind turbines cause TV and radio reception problems as well as health problems for people and animals.
7. Invasive Species: We oppose the FSA penalizing farmers for denying reenrollment in the CRP program because of standing reed canary grass.
8. Technical Colleges: Because the technical college system is funded by the local property tax, the local area should pro-

vide the training that is needed for the businesses common to the area (i.e. agriculture, electrical).

9. Safety: We encourage law enforcement officials to force bicyclists to obey appropriate traffic laws and ticket accordingly.
10. Wisconsin's agricultural products have a positive economic impact for Wisconsin's farmers and agri-businesses. Preference for State funded grants or loans shall be given to, but not limited to, any "agribusiness" within an Agricultural Enterprise Area.
11. Reinstate PACE.
12. We support lowering the "stray voltage" action threshold to 10 mV peak to peak measured without a 500 ohm resistor, using equipment that can measure transients and other high frequency events.
13. We support lessening the requirement for county UW-Extension agents to have a four year bachelor degree instead of a master's degree.
14. We support Farm to School Programs to promote buying local foods and education of food promotion, nutrition and the environment.
15. We support funding of USDA ACEP Agricultural Conservation Easement Program for protection of agricultural lands and wetlands.

Membership Incentives

Membership Worker Recruitment Incentive

County Farm Bureau volunteers will receive \$20 for every new voting or associate member they sign between October 1, 2014 and September 30, 2015. Qualifying new members must (a) have no previous Farm Bureau membership, or (b) be more than 25 months past their due date.

2015 Farm Bureau Producer Club

Farm Bureau volunteers qualify as members of the Producer Club by signing five or more new Farm Bureau members during the membership year. Members of the 2015 Producer Club will enjoy an exclusive gathering for members and spouse/guest at the December, 2015 WFBF Annual Meeting. Producer Club members also receive a commemorative pin and a special gift in recognition of their efforts.

County Early Bird Bonanza

County Farm Bureau will receive \$1,000 cash award if the

county Farm Bureau reaches its new voting goal by the April 30, 2015 month-end cut-off.

Summer Renewal Rally


Volunteer membership workers signing up past-due membership renewals or new members between July 1 and September 30 will be entered in a drawing for one of five \$100 cash awards. Volunteers signing ten or more renewals during this period will also be entered in the grand prize drawing for a trip for two to the AFBF Annual Meeting in Orlando, FL January 10-13, 2016. For every new or past-due member signed, the membership worker must complete and mail in an entry card with the membership payment. A drawing will be held on September 30 (membership year-end).

2015 Membership Incentive Rebate Program

- Counties reaching a gain in voting membership by year-end will be paid \$1 per voting member. County will receive an additional \$2 per voting member for every voting member that exceeds the previous year's voting membership.
- Counties reaching a gain in total membership by year-end will be paid \$1 per voting member. County will receive an additional \$2 per member for every member that exceeds the previous year's total membership.
- The minimum amount a county can earn by reaching the above gains is \$400 for a voting gain and \$400 for a total gain.

Pop Tabs Wanted

Keep saving your pop tabs for the Ronald McDonald House! Ronald McDonald House is a "home away from home" for families of seriously ill or injured



children. Since their doors opened in 1984, more than 35,000 families have stayed at the Ronald McDonald House in Milwaukee while their child received critical medical care. In 2013 alone, they served nearly 1,000 families. They have been at full occupancy with their 38 guest rooms—often with a wait list of anywhere from five to 20 families each day.

At the district 1 Ronald McDonald House event on May 3, 78.85 pounds of pop tabs were collected. Each district is

having a competition that goes through December, so keep saving your pop tabs.

Since 2000, little aluminum tabs on the tops of soda cans have meant more than \$210,000 to the Ronald McDonald House. Revenue from recycling these little bits of aluminum helps provide a home away from home for families whose seriously ill children are undergoing treatment in the Milwaukee area.
