Kenosha County Farm Bureau Members Attend Ag Day at the Capitol

Hundreds of attendees filled the Monona Terrace Community and Convention Center and Capitol on January 24 for the annual Ag Day at the Capitol presented by WFBF.

While at the Monona Terrace attendees heard from Governor Scott Walker. Governor Walker recognizes and understands the importance of agriculture. He spoke about the need for a stable healthcare plan, how broadband will transform agriculture and the family farm fund for students who are studying agriculture. Governor Walker also signed an executive order to support rural economic development. It's important to have young people to take over the farm and the executive order will provide low interest loans and scholarships for agriculture.

Some of the hot topics discussed at the Monona Terrace included:

- **CAFO:** In October, Governor Walker announced that he wants to work with the legislature and the EPA to transfer regulatory authority over CAFO facilities from the DNR to DATCP. DATCP offers technical expertise and could help make the program more efficient and effective, legislators were asked to support this transfer.
- **Wetland:** Legislators were asked to support two bills that exempt nonfederal and artificial wetlands from DNR permitting requirements. It also requires parties building on these lands to mitigate with new wetlands at a ratio of 1.2 acres for every acre lost, but would no longer require an environmental review. This is a significant piece of legislation for those looking to develop land but have faced roadblocks from isolated or artificial wetland designations, and for farmers looking to protect tillable acreage from being classified as state wetlands.

- **Wisconsin Livestock Identification Consortium:** Two bills have been proposed and legislators are asked to support the bills that provide additional funding to the livestock premises registration program. The funding to properly administer this program is not keeping up with the programming costs. These bills will put an additional \$200,000 in general purpose revenue into the program in the 2017-19 biennium.
- **Barns:** In recent years there has been a surge in refurbishing barns that were built prior to 1965 as a means for extra income, using the barns for weddings, social events, meetings, etc. Two bills have been authored and legislators are asked to support the bills that maintain basic, yet essential, safety requirements while providing regulatory simplicity and certainty for those wishing to use the barns.
- **Schools:** Bills have been introduced to increase sparsity aid payments to eligible schools by \$6.5 million in the next school year. The plan would allow school districts with low revenue caps to increase the amount they spend from the current \$9,100 per students limit to \$9,400 per student next school year. It would increase by \$100 each year until it reaches \$9,800. This would impact about 120 low-spending school districts that qualify for sparsity aid (districts under 745 students).

Following Governor Walker's address and the legislative briefings, members walked to the Capitol to talk with the legislators. It's important to meet with the legislators and get them familiar with agriculture and the issues you are facing on your farm. Wisconsin is America's Dairyland and we need to tell our legislators how important agriculture is in Wisconsin.

Ag Day Reading Event



Membership Dues Increasing October 1



At the September 2017 meeting, the Kenosha County membership voted to increase the county membership dues by \$5. The dues amount will increase to \$55 effective **October 1**.

The additional \$5 will go to the Wisconsin Farm Bureau Federation, as there are increasing the dues at that time.

When you join Farm Bureau, you not only become a member of Kenosha County Farm Bureau, but also the Wisconsin Farm Bureau and the American Farm Bureau.

Currently your cost to be a Farm Bureau member is \$50. That is broken down as follows:

- **Wisconsin Farm Bureau Federation = \$36**
State activities, conducting programs and staffing. Consumer and youth education, issue advocacy, leadership development and member publications are services that are furnished with state dues.

- **Wisconsin Farm Bureau Federation Services Program = \$3**

When county secretaries retired, Farm Bureau offered a services program to counties. Kenosha County is a part of this program in which the district coordinator acts as the county secretary. There are three portions to the program that include administrative, financials and the newsletter program.

- **American Farm Bureau Federation = \$4**
A portion of your dues are forwarded to support Farm Bureau activities at the national level. These funds support agriculture's voice in our nation's capital as well as the many programs that AFBF has in place to educate consumers, share the message of agriculture and provide online resources to its members.

- **Accidental Death Policy = \$1**
\$1 of your dues is applied toward an accidental death insurance policy that is a benefit of membership that covers you as a member, your spouse and eligible children. Coverage begins at \$500 and increases in value for the member and spouse with each consecutive year of membership up to \$3,500.

- **Kenosha County Farm Bureau = \$6**
Funds local events and activities. This includes county meetings, scholarships, ag in the classroom and many more to promote Farm Bureau and agriculture in Kenosha County.

The Kenosha County Farm Bureau dues will be \$55 effective **October 1**. Anyone whose membership dues are due on that date will receive an invoice in mid-August reflecting the increase in dues.

Kenosha County Focuses on Membership

The membership year is **October 1 through September 30**, and each year the county has new goals to achieve to maintain current membership numbers. The Wisconsin Farm Bureau Federation provides membership volunteers and county Farm Bureau's with incentives to achieve their goals.

County Farm Bureau volunteers will receive \$20 for every new voting or associate member they sign between **October 1, 2017 and September 28, 2018**. Qualifying new members must: (a) have no previous Farm Bureau membership, or (b) be more than 25 months past their due date.

The county Farm Bureau will receive \$1,000 cash award if the county Farm Bureau reaches its new voting goal by the **March 30** month-end cut-off. Farm Bureau volunteers qualify as members of the Farm Bureau Proud Club by signing five or more new Farm Bureau members during the membership year. Members of the 2018 Farm Bureau Proud Club and his or her spouse or guest will receive exclusive recognition at the December 2018 WFBF Annual Meeting.

Farm Bureau Proud Club members also receive a commemorative pin and a special gift in recognition of their efforts.

First Down: Volunteer membership workers who signed up at least one new member by January 31 received Farm Bureau microwave popcorn.



America's breadbasket means:

- The wheat that is grown to make bread.
- The area known as the 'prairie fields of grain.'

Forge means:

- A mountain.
- The workplace of a blacksmith.
- Fireplace.
- Where a blacksmith heats the metal.

Using the book of the year, "John Deere, That's Who!" this year's essay topic is 'Inventions that have made agriculture great.' Students will write about inventions that have made agriculture advance in technology, efficiency and productivity.

The essay contest is open to fourth and fifth grade students in public schools, private schools and home school programs. Students involved in 4-H, PALS and after school programs also


The WFBF Annual Meeting gives members of all ages the opportunity to reconnect and network with friends, while attending awards banquets, workshops and the delegate session.

In the book "John Deere, That's Who!" the Deere family decided to move to Moline, Illinois, so the company was closer to the Mississippi River for better waterpower and easier deliveries. The 'prairie fields of grain' became known as America's breadbasket. John was a young blacksmith originally from Vermont where his forge burned to the ground and he rebuilt it before moving to Illinois. A forge is the workplace of a blacksmith. It also means fireplace, or hearth, where the blacksmith heats the metal.
