Little Britches Shows Set for Fair Season – Sign Up Today!

Have you ever wondered how a fair animal is shown?

On **Sunday, August 3** and **Saturday, August 16**, youth from around the county learn about dairy cattle showmanship through the Marathon County Farm Bureau's (MCFB) Little Britches Showmanship.

The **August 3** event will be held at the tent outside of the youth building on the Wisconsin Valley Fairgrounds at noon, with two age classes for youth to participate in:

- 5-6 years of age
- 7-8 years of age

The **August 16** event will be held at the livestock pavilion on the Athens Fairgrounds at noon. The two age classes for youth to participate in are:

- 5-7 years of age
- 8-10 years of age

Animals no older than five months will be provided for the youth who participate. Participants will receive a t-shirt, photo with a calf and a medallion for their efforts.

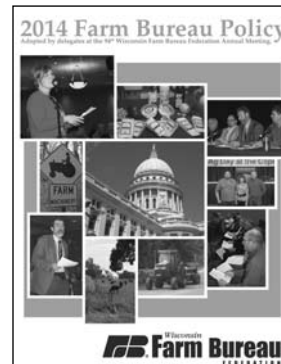

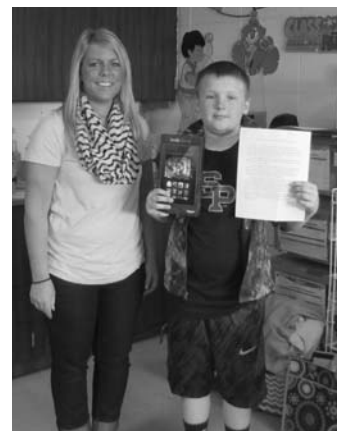

Given in honor of Aldo Leopold's Land Ethic, the Leopold Conservation Award recognizes extraordinary achievement in voluntary conservation on working lands, inspires other landowners through these examples and provides a visible forum where leaders from the agricultural community are recognized as conservation leaders outside of the industry. In his influential book, "A Sand County Almanac" (1949), Leopold called for an ethical relationship between people and the land they own and manage, which he called "an evolutionary possibility and an ecological necessity."
