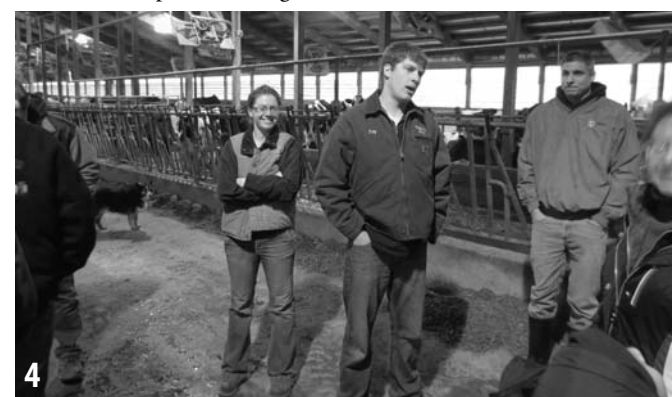
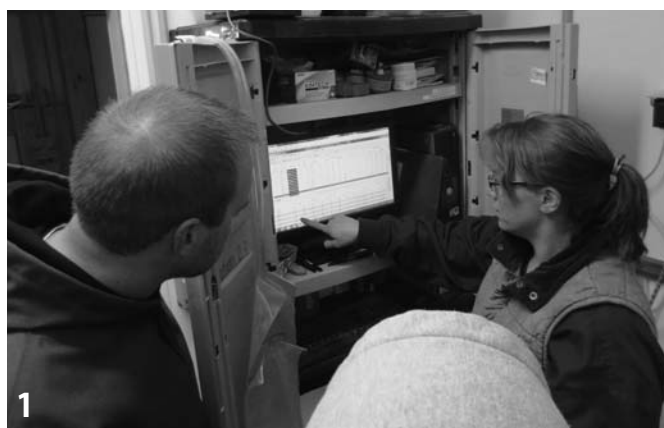

Overall, 29 fourth and fifth grade students participated in the 2014 Essay Contest. This year's topic was "Wisconsin gardens provide many food choices for us". Marinette County Farm Bureau supplied 15 schools in Marinette County with the Wisconsin Ag in the Classroom Book of the Year, "First Peas to the Table" as well as supporting lesson plan information and other resources for the teachers to use to help students to participate. In addition, MCFB donated the same book to libraries throughout the county.

The winning essay was written by Maya Carviou of Marinette. Maya's parents are fellow Farm Bureau members, Mark and Dawn Carviou. Maya is a fifth grade student at St. Thomas Aquinas in Peshtigo. Maya received a \$25 cash prize for her winning entry. Additional winners were second place, Livia Benson, and third place, Clara Junemann. Wisconsin Gardens Provide Many Food Choices for Us

When many people think of meals, they think of pizza and hot dogs. They don't think of the other choices that are healthier for you like salads with ingredients that you have grown. Eating freshly grown veggies and fruits is very important and probably the most important food choice someone can make. Gardens are not a hard task to accomplish and when you live in a house with at least a small yard, you can still make a garden. Apartments in the city offer you space on the rooftop so you can make a garden for your family and neighbors. Wisconsin may not be called the garden state, but programs like this one help kids understand how important it is for families and schools to promote gardening. Some programs donate cabbages or other plants to schools and certain grades so they can grow that food in the summer. Some city blocks in big cities are donated to the residents so they can grow a section of fruit if their yard is too small. Eating healthy gets your day going. Some families grow enough food so they can donate to a farmers market for others that can't grow a certain veggie. Things that people can grow and that are edible are sweet corn, cucumbers, egg plant, muskmelon, peppers, tomatoes, watermelon, zucchini, cilantro, basil, mint, tricolor sage, blue berries, strawberries, lemons, leaf lettuce, radish and sweet peas. Standing Up for Wisconsin Agriculture

As Wisconsin's lone member of the House Agriculture Committee, I have worked hard to be a voice for Wisconsin's agriculture, food and forestry sectors since I arrived in Congress. I took this responsibility seriously during the process of writing the 2014 Farm Bill.

While the road to final passage was long and complicated, I believe that the final product represents a step forward for Wisconsin agriculture. The 2014 Farm Bill will save taxpayers \$23 billion from the previous bill. The bill eliminates direct payments to farmers who were previously paid regardless of market conditions, and it also repeals or consolidates nearly 100 additional programs.

Representing America's Dairyland, I am pleased with the dairy policy reforms included in the bill. The Farm Bill offers dairy farmers a voluntary margin insurance program that will help them manage risk and will work well for Wisconsin farmers of all sizes. I also worked with my Wisconsin colleagues to ensure that the bill did not include provisions that would have unfairly harmed Wisconsin farmers.

In the weeks and months ahead, I'll continue to be a voice for Wisconsin agriculture as Congress tackles issues ranging from energy to trade to transportation.

New Program Announced - Our Food Link

Many of you might be familiar with a program called 'Food Check-Out Week'. Historically, this week has been used to celebrate the week that many families have earned enough income to buy their groceries for the year. As our Farm Bureaus are able to get more active and engaged and there are more opportunities to meet with consumers throughout the year, the American Farm Bureau Women's Leadership Committee worked hard to design a program that could meet the needs of Farm Bureau's that work tirelessly promoting agriculture all year at various events.

'Our Food Link', which replaces Food Check-Out Week, is a year-round program that county and state Farm Bureau volunteers can use to effectively reach consumers of all ages and backgrounds with information about today's agriculture. The AFBF has designed a planning toolkit to help counties get started thinking about projects that will engage people in your community.
