Ag in the Classroom Essay Contest Announced

The Jefferson County Farm Bureau is promoting the 2017-2018 Wisconsin Farm Bureau's Ag in the Classroom essay contest for fourth and fifth grade students. The essay is titled 'Inventions that have made agriculture great.' Students will be able to learn about technology and science that is used in agriculture and share their findings in their essays.

The contest is sponsored by We Energies, Wisconsin Ag in the Classroom and the Wisconsin Farm Bureau Foundation. Last year 2,818 students from nine districts participated in the state's essay contest.

Participating Jefferson County schools' fourth and fifth grader students need to submit essays by **Monday, April 1**, to Patti Hurtgen at 600 W. Blackhawk Drive, #4, Fort Atkinson, WI 53538 or to jeffersoncountyagessays@gmail.com.

Jefferson county fourth and fifth grade teachers whose entire class participates in the essay contest will receive a \$30 gift certificate to Nasco. The gift cards are provided by the Jefferson County Ag in the Classroom committee.

Essays can be submitted at any time, with a final deadline day of **April 1**. With cold weather this winter, students can spend their time indoors learning about tractors, machinery and technology.

There were 188 essays submitted in Jefferson County in 2017. Fourth-grader Isabel Kuchta, a student at Paul's Lutheran School in Fort Atkinson, was the county and district winner.

Contest Rules

- The essay contest is open to fourth and fifth grade students in public schools, private schools and home school programs. Students involved in 4-H, PALS and after school programs are also encouraged to participate.
- Essays must be handwritten in ink or be computer generated. They must be single-sided and fit on one sheet of paper.
- The essay must be 100- to 300-words in length (using common MS Word 'word count' methods for counting words, numbers and abbreviations).
- Essays will be judged on content (25 pts), grammar and spelling (15 pts) and neatness (10 pts).
- Essays need to include: student's name, grade level, parents' names, teacher's name, school name and address, school phone number and county on the back of the essay. Please do not identify the student on the front side.

Contest Prizes

- Each Jefferson County classroom that enters essays into the contest will receive the Farm Bureau Book of the Year – "John Deere, That's Who!" by Tracy Nelson Maurer.
- The Jefferson County winner will receive an ice cream party for their classroom, a \$30 cash prize and four tickets to the 2018 Watertown Agribusiness Dairy Breakfast. Cash prizes of \$20 and \$10 will be awarded to second and third place, respectively.
- Nine district winners will be chosen. District and state winners will be announced in May.
- Each district winner will receive a classroom presentation in April for their class, homeroom or home school group.
- The state winner will receive a special award.

Membership Dues Increasing October 1

Effective **October 1, 2018**, the annual dues for Jefferson County Farm Bureau are increasing by \$5 to \$55. The additional \$5 will go to the Wisconsin Farm Bureau Federation, as they are increasing the dues at that time.

When you join Farm Bureau, you not only become a member of Jefferson County Farm Bureau, but also Wisconsin Farm Bureau and American Farm Bureau.

Currently your cost to be a Farm Bureau member is \$50. That is broken down as follows:

- **Wisconsin Farm Bureau Federation = \$36.** This includes state activities, conducting programs and staffing. Consumer and youth education, issue advocacy, leadership development and member publications are services that are furnished with state dues.
- **Wisconsin Farm Bureau Federation Services Program = \$3.** Jefferson County is a part of this program in which the district coordinator acts as the county secretary. There are three portions to the program that include administrative, financials and the newsletter.
- **American Farm Bureau Federation = \$4.** A portion of your dues are forwarded to support at the national level. These funds support agriculture's voice in our nation's capital as well as the many programs that AFBF has in place to educate consumers, share the message of agriculture and provide online resources to members.
- **Accidental Death Policy = \$1.** The accidental death insurance policy is a benefit of membership that covers you as a member, your spouse and eligible children. Coverage begins at \$500 and increases in value for the member and spouse with each consecutive year of membership up to \$3,500.
- **Jefferson County Farm Bureau = \$6.** This funds local events and activities including county meetings, scholarships, Ag in the Classroom and many more to promote Farm Bureau and agriculture in Jefferson County.

Anyone whose membership dues are due, will receive an invoice in mid-August reflecting this increase.

Jefferson County Focuses on Membership

The membership year is **October 1-September 30**, and each year the county has new goals to achieve to maintain current membership numbers.

Wisconsin Farm Bureau Federation provides membership volunteers and county Farm Bureau's with incentives to achieve their goals.

County Farm Bureau volunteers will receive \$20 for every new voting or associate member they sign between **October 1, 2017, and September 28, 2018**. Qualifying new members must (a) have no previous Farm Bureau membership, or (b) be more than 25 months past their due date.

County Farm Bureau will receive \$1,000 cash award if the county Farm Bureau reaches its new voting goal by the **March 30, 2018**, month-end cut-off.

Farm Bureau volunteers qualify as members of the Farm Bureau Proud Club by signing five or more new Farm Bureau members during the membership year. Members of the 2018 Farm Bureau Proud Club and their spouse/guest will receive exclusive recognition at the December 2018 WFBF Annual Meeting. Farm Bureau Proud Club members also receive a commemorative pin and a special gift in recognition of their efforts.
