This is not a reference to the winds that blow during the changing weather battle between winter cold and spring warmth, rather the political winds that are blowing.

This year is an election year so, to be fair, after five years of difficult times in dairy and a rough time in most of agriculture, people are starting to take notice. Now, companies are starting

to struggle, and communities are starting to wonder what they will do without the money farmers bring to our local economies.

The trade wars are getting worked out. There have been no less than five trade agreements settled including U.S.-China, USMCA, U.S.-Japan, U.S.-European Beef Agreement, U.S.-South Korea Rice Agreement and others. The passage of these trade agreements is certainly welcomed, and the President has delivered on his campaign promises. Together, we have fought a tough battle of attrition and we have prevailed.

We also must recognize bipartisan support of the final trade deals with Congressman Ron Kind representing our district once again stepping up to support trade. Both Senators Ron Johnson and Tammy Baldwin also joined in supporting USMCA.

Now, to be fair, the President's claim that farmer income being up 50 percent is irresponsible and the comments of farmers needing to buy new tractors and get more land is upsetting when we watch prices start to erode immediately following the passage of all these trade deals. Now, it's Coronavirus? Perhaps it's time I get a slice of lime and open a bottle.

At the state level, Governor Tony Evers set the stage for agriculture policy during his State-of-the-State address when he spent more than half of his address talking about the importance of agriculture to the state's economy.

Certainly, he spoke of dairy while expressing the importance of the diversity of agriculture that exists in Wisconsin. He brought forth a set of bold initiatives to help agriculture move forward.

Quickly, the legislature, not to be outdone, brought out a 'bolder' initiative to help farmers. We have several great things in the works – increases to Farmland Preservation, tax refunds on agriculture buildings, Extension positions, money for dairy export initiatives, small processor grants – all of which could be huge for Wisconsin farmers.

Now, let me tell you about the Speakers Task Force on Water Quality and the bills stemming from those recommendations. All together there are more than 30 bills in play at the time of this being written, many have merit and many will pass, if we all work together to express and support what agriculture needs.

If we sit on the sidelines, all of this will be nothing more than political posturing and pontificating and all will be for naught. What we really need is for the posturing to stop and our legislators work for their citizens by compromising and allowing a victory for everyone.

Please speak up and demand cooperation.

Spring will be around the corner soon; the snow will melt and the grass green up. The winds will settle down and we will go to work doing what we do best, taking care of our livestock, fields and crops and all of our wonderful natural resources. We know at the end of the day our calling is a noble and just cause providing food, fuel and fiber for the world. Stay safe and warm till we visit again and thank you for all you do.

As always, "enough is too much."

An WFBF Annual Meeting and YFA Conference to Remember

More than 60 members from across District 4 traveled to Wisconsin Dells for the WFBF Annual Meeting and YFA Conference on December 6-9.

Beginning on December 6, 20 Young Farmers and Agriculturists (YFA) members attended the YFA Conference. Members were treated to a Farm Bureau birthday party, celebrating 100 years of Wisconsin Farm Bureau.

During the District YFA meeting, members were introduced to one another and participated in activities to get them acquainted with other attendees and the conference. The evening concluded with a high-energy evening at the Tom Foolerys Adventure Park.

On December 7, District 4 was represented by Allison Bragger, Andrea Rippley and Kyle Danzinger, all from Buffalo County, in the Discussion Meet. Throughout the day, members watched the contest as well as participated in co-current workshops on agriculture topics and issues.

WFBF Annual Meeting participants and delegates arrived for WFBF's centennial celebration. The afternoon began with the Farm Bureau Proud Club luncheon. Joe Bragger, Buffalo County, and Savannah Brown, Jackson County, achieved Farm Bureau Proud Club status in 2019. They each recruited five or more new members, earning a coveted seat at the luncheon.

Later that evening, members listened to two panel discussions hosted by Max Armstrong as they celebrated WFBF's centennial. The panels featured past presidents of the organizations as well as a legislative panel highlighting Wisconsin Farm Bureau's accomplishments from the past 100 years.

December 8 brought the conclusion of the YFA Conference, with the Discussion Meet finals as well as brunch speaker Scott VanderWal, Vice President of the American



Farm Bureau Federation.

Ben Huber from Green County was selected for the Excellence in Ag award and Travis and Krista Klinkner from Vernon County received the Achievement Award. Meikah Dado from UW-Madison Collegiate Farm Bureau was selected as the Collegiate Discussion Meet winner and Rachel Leege from Green County was selected as the YFA Discussion Meet winner.

The remainder of the day featured workshops that focused on water quality, mental health, dairy revenue protection, hemp and a presentation by Ag in the Classroom Book of the Year author, Lisl Detlefsen.

The awards banquet was held Sunday evening. Craig Culver was presented the Distinguished Service to Wisconsin Agriculture awards for his outstanding, long-term contributions to Wisconsin's agricultural industry. Robert and Karen Schwandt, of Dodge County, received the Distinguished Service to Farm Bureau award, the highest award WFBF bestows upon its members. Eau Claire County members Brenda Dowiasch and Dawn Gibson also were recognized as graduates of the WFBF

Leadership Institute.

Before concluding the WFBF Annual Meeting, nearly 250 delegates established new policy directives for the organization during the policy development session. Resolutions were submitted as a part of the grassroots policy development process.


Among the policies was the support of research and development of a dairy growth management and other systems that provide increased dairy-industry stability and producer profitability.

Following the conclusion of the WFBF Annual Meeting, District 4 Director Joe Bragger was elected by the Board of Directors to serve as the Wisconsin Farm Bureau Federation President. District 4 Promotion and Education Chair Darby Sampson also was appointed as the WFBF Promotion and Education Committee Chair and will serve a one-year term on the WFBF Board of Directors.

Ag Day at the Capitol Brings Farmers to Madison

On February 4, more than 330 farmers and agriculturists gathered at the Monona Terrace Community and Convention Center in Madison for Ag Day at the Capitol.

Ag Day at the Capitol is an annual event for Wisconsin farmers and agriculturists to learn more about state issues affecting agriculture and meet with their state legislators.

Attendees started the day by listening to issue briefings on wildlife damage claims, food labeling and a host of other bills including farmer commercial driver's license exemptions and farmland preservation tax credit.

At 1 p.m., Governor Tony Evers served as the event's keynote speaker. The Governor shared his focus on water quality in the state and why he declared 2019 the year of clean drinking water.

"Obviously it's going to take more than one year to deal with (clean water)," said Gov. Evers. "I have the utmost faith in the farm community. They are the original stewards of the land, after Native Americans, and there is no reason we can't work together to make clean water a priority."

Gov. Evers also emphasized his three-pronged approach to help rural Wisconsin.

Evers said, "I just want to work together and have some good conversations and do what's right for rural Wisconsin."

He asked farmers and agriculturists to stay engaged and be part of the solution.

"We appreciate Governor Evers taking the time to attend Ag Day at the Capitol this year," said WFBF President Joe Bragger. "Our farmers and agriculturists want to know that their rural communities are a priority."

Following the Governor's speech, the afternoon session was a legislative panel on water quality. The panel was moderated by Dennis Frame, co-founder of Discovery Farms, and was comprised of Senators Howard Marklein and Patrick Testin and Representatives Todd Novak, Travis Tranel, Tony Kurtz and Katrina Shankland.

The panel discussed:

- Agriculture's role in developing solutions for cleaner water throughout Wisconsin.
- Ways in which water quality can be positively impacted without new regulations.
- How the legislature will support Wisconsin farmers and local communities to identify solutions for cleaner water.

"It was appropriate to focus on water during our afternoon program," said Bragger. "With this topic at the forefront of many discussions throughout the state, farmers and agriculturists need to hear about the latest updates on legislation and how they can be part of the conversation."

The legislators featured on the panel are from the Speaker's Task Force on Water Quality and who represent the Central Sands and southwest Wisconsin areas who are engaged in water legislation and talked in-depth about water issues facing rural Wisconsin.

At the Capitol, at the same time as the water panel, Wisconsin state Assembly Speaker Robin Vos and other Assembly leadership held a press conference to emphasize their plans to help Wisconsin farmers. Through a combination of existing legislation and new proposals there is an opportunity to put together a comprehensive package to help farmers during these stressful economic times.

"The news that the assembly leadership is putting a large focus on agriculture is welcomed news," Bragger said. "Wisconsin agriculture is open to all ideas on how we can keep this state's rural economy afloat. How exciting is this to have the attention on the agriculture community? Thank you to Speaker Vos and the Wisconsin Assembly leaders for their work."

The afternoon's program wrapped up with attendees hearing about water-specific bills and then walked to the Capitol to meet with their legislators from their respective areas.

Rural Mutual Insurance Company and GROWMARK, Inc., were major sponsors of the event. Co-sponsors of the event, with Wisconsin Farm Bureau Federation, included the Dairy Business Association, Professional Dairy Producers of Wisconsin, Wisconsin Cattlemen's Association, Wisconsin Corn Growers Association, Wisconsin Hemp Alliance, Wisconsin Horse Council, Wisconsin Pork Association, Wisconsin Potato and Vegetable Growers Association, Wisconsin Soybean Association and the Wisconsin State Cranberry Growers Association.



District 4 Young Farmers and Agriculturist Members Travel to Illinois

Seventeen members from District 4 participated in the District 4 Plows 'n Cows bus tour on January 24. The group departed from Wisconsin in the early morning hours and traveled to Grand Detour, Illinois, to visit the John Deere Historic Site.

The John Deere Historic Site is where John Deere first created the steel plow. YFA members saw the excavated site where John Deere's original workshop was located as well as watch a blacksmith demonstration in a replica of his original shop.

The original John Deere family home also is

located on the site, and members were caught a glimpse of pioneer life in 1836.

From Illinois, members traveled to Monticello, home to Voegeli Farms, Inc. Voegeli Farms was homesteaded in 1854 and is home of the country's oldest Brown Swiss dairy cattle herd. Voegeli's have had four World Dairy Expo Champions, more than 195 All-American Nominations, 43 All-Americans, 44 Reserve All-Americans and 32 honorable mentions.

The 220-cow herd produces milk that is made into cheese and is the exclusive milk for Yodelay Yogurt. After touring the farm, members tasted

the yogurt before heading to their final stop.

Finally, the tour stopped at New Glarus Brewing Company. Located in the hills of New Glarus, the brewing company is home to world-class, handcrafted beers sold exclusively in Wisconsin. Members participated in a self-guided tour and tasting before embarking home.

Be Prepared

Farm Bureau Hosts Grain Bin Safety Demonstration

On October 2, 2019, the Trempealeau County Farm Bureau hosted its first grain bin safety training. We had approximately 30 attendees with a mix of farmers and firefighter and emergency medical services personnel. Topics covered ranged from proper grain storage to help prevent issues with stored grains and safely emptying bins to what happens when grain entrapment occurs and how EMS responds to grain entrapments.

The Arcadia Glencoe Fire Department demonstrated some of the equipment that they use while performing a grain rescue and discussed the extensive training they do in order to be prepared should there be a grain entrapment. The last few harvest seasons have been difficult due to weather and wet grains. Hosting a safety meeting couldn't have been timelier with much of the grain coming in above average moistures and with low test weights making proper storage difficult.

Many grain bin manufacturers have protocols and advice for how to get plugged bins flowing again and a call to your local bin representative could be the difference between safely emptying your grain bins and having an entrapment. The Trempealeau County Farm Bureau is looking forward to growing and expanding its grain safety training to be more hands on and in-depth, if you have any questions or comments please contact one of the board members.
