In January, the American Farm Bureau Convention was held in Puerto Rico.


There were many county, district and state meetings in the past few months. I'm glad that I participated in all of these events and am proud of the accomplishments of District 2!





Youth Ag Summit Reaches Maximum of 75 FFA Student Participants

The 8th Annual District 2 Youth Ag Summit event was hosted on Dec. 7, 2022 at Kuhn North America, Inc. in Brodhead. The event's focus was to expose high school students to different non-production careers in agriculture. Seventy-five high school students from Sun Prairie East, Parkview, Janesville Parker, Cambridge, Janesville Craig, Hustisford, Sauk Prairie, Belleville, Sun Prairie West, Milton, Stoughton, Evansville and Waunakee attended this year's event.

Students were each provided a padfolio and the opportunity to hear from Kuhn North America's Director of Human Resources, Jill Leitzen, as well as two of our three breakout session speakers.

Dustin Williams, Agribusiness and Farm Management Instructor at Blackhawk Technical College, Erik Huschitt, CEO and General Manager at Badger State Ethanol, and Steve Stettler, Master Cheesemaker at Decatur Dairy, Inc. served as breakout speakers for the event. Each of them hosted a breakout session where they shared about their background, their employer and what opportunities are available to students interested in potentially working for their company or pursuing a similar career.

Speakers encouraged students to take advantage of leadership and networking opportunities, jobs shadows,

internships and stressed the importance of not being scared to reach out and ask questions. The speakers also encouraged students to research

Student Scholarship Deadline July 1



Are you a Dane County Farm Bureau member currently attending college and looking for a \$1,000 scholarship opportunity to help with your fall

Please review application criteria and deadline

- 1. Applicants or their parent(s)/guardian(s) must be a member of Dane County Farm Bureau.
- 2. Applicants must have completed one year of advanced education after high school before they apply. High school seniors are not eligible.
- 3. Preference will be given to applicants enrolled in an agriculture program.
- 4. Applications must be completed in full and submitted by July 1. Incomplete or applications submitted after July 1, may be disqualified. Scholarship presentations will take place at the Dane County Farm Bureau Annual Meeting in September.
- 5. Applicants will need to submit proof of fall registration with their application.
- 6. Previous scholarship recipients cannot apply again for the scholarship.
- 7. Judges will use the following criteria for evaluation: Academics 50 percent; activities and awards 30 percent; and need 20 percent.
- 8. This is a \$1,000 scholarship.

Scholarship applications must be received by July 1.

BTC Offers Youth Tractor Safety Training

Blackhawk Technical College-Monroe Campus will be offering a youth tractor safety training program from April 3 to May 16. The purpose of the course is to instruct youth between the ages of 12 and 16 on safe use of farm equipment and provide youth with a 24-hour course to comply with Wisconsin Act 455 and Federal Child Labor Standards.

Puerto Rico faces labor shortages just as we do and if you think Wisconsin roads are bad, drive on Puerto Rico's roads – you'll appreciate ours. Although there are similarities, there are many differences, too. With the tropical temps, farmers' investment in infrastructure is often minimal. Processing of the coffee is done in the open with only a roof overhead.

Culturally, Puerto Ricans love to party. They also operate at a slower pace than us American's are used to – island time. The slower pace allowed for time to network and enjoy the company of those you are with.

FROM FIELD TO BOTTLE
















San Juan Artisan Distillers is the only rum brand in Puerto Rico that focuses on producing rum from fresh sugarcane juice. Once a booming agricultural sector on the island, San Juan Artisan Distillers is the only remaining sugarcane plantation in Puerto Rico. The distillery was established in 2011 by Don Pepe Alvarez. The rum begins in the plantation's sugarcane fields. Once the sugarcane is ready, it is harvested and transported to the distillery. The sugarcane is picked up by a grappler that loads it onto the trailer to be hauled off the field. Once off the field, sugarcane moves along a conveyor to the press. The press squeezes sugarcane juices from the plant to be prepared for fermentation. Rum at San Juan Artisan Distillers is fermented in both stills and whiskey barrels where yeast distills the plant's natural sugars into alcohol. Eventually, the liquid undergoes distillation where alcohol within the fermented juice is extracted and prepared for bottling. San Juan Artisan Distillers is home to TRESCLAVOS Ron Caña, an award-winning rum inspired by Puerto Rican tradition and is infused with fruits raised on farms within 50 miles of the distillery.


