Greetings.

Wisconsin Farm Bureau has been busy advocating for \$150 million for an agricultural road improvement plan, also known as ARIP. The bill would establish a program to provide grants for local governments to repair and rebuild crumbling roads and bridges that create problems for farmers.

The WFBF Dairy Committee and Farm Bill Working Group have come up with a set of recommendations. These recommendations were advocated for in Washington, D.C., earlier this month. WFBF's Governmental Relations team has been extremely busy with the biennial state budget and the farm bill.

The board also made several improvements to the grassroots policy development process. Some of these updates will need to wait until next year to be fully implemented due to timing. This year look for expanded time and much improved communication with the District 3 Policy Development Committee representative, Andrew Dal Santo. Next year there will be more training for the Policy Development Committee members. Your board has also adopted the Foundation Task Force's recommendations on improving and growing the Wisconsin Farm Bureau Foundation. This is extremely important to grow our programs for education and leadership development. Remember this year's Giving Day is Aug. 2. We are hoping to reach our goal of \$30,000 raised.

The YFA 35 Under 35 program has received national recognition. Congratulations and well deserved to those that played a role in creating the program. We had several winners from District 3 last year and hope to see some additional worthy candidates nominated this year.

Also be sure to check out the new Gather Wisconsin website at gatherwisconsin.com. This is an awesome project that was a directive of WFBF members in our strategic planning process and developed by the Public Relations team to help connect consumers with the farmers behind their food.

Keep signing up those members, both renewals and new members. Let's move our district team, the Southwest Stockmen, back into first place. Let's do it for Melissa as a THANK YOU for her years as our District Coordinator and to WELCOME Katie Fitzsimmons to our team.

One final note of thanks again to Melissa Jacobson, we'll see you around in your new role as the Director of Young Leader Programs and wish you the best of luck.

Stalsberg Named Ag in the Classroom Essay Contest State Winner



Each year the Wisconsin Farm Bureau's Ag in the Classroom program hosts an essay contest to engage students in writing, reading and research through the context of food and agriculture. Essays are judged on content, grade-appropriate

writing benchmarks, and creativity. This contest is open to all fourth and fifth grade students across the state.

Students were asked to write a 500-word essay with the theme, "You're Gonna Need Milk for That – Wisconsin Dairy supports our bodies, communities and economy."

Bree Stalsberg, a fourth-grade student from Fennimore, was selected as both the state and District 3 winner in the Wisconsin Ag in the Classroom fourth-grade contest. Bree is the daughter of Kory and Andrea Stalsberg. Her teacher is Emily Kamps at Fennimore Elementary School in Grant County.

Tara Lenzendorf, a fifth-grade student from Seneca, was selected as the District 3 winner of the fifth-grade contest. Her teacher is Kari Oppriecht at Seneca Elementary School in Crawford County.

More than 1,800 students wrote essays for the competition, which is sponsored by Culvers, Dairy Farmers of Wisconsin, WE Energies and the Wisconsin

Farm Bureau Foundation. Essay entries were judged at the county, district and state levels – with stiff

competition in each division. Nine district winners were named state finalists and received a prize package including a medal, Wisconsin dairy books, admission to the Farm Wisconsin Discovery Center and Culver's prize pack. The state winner also received a plaque and prizes valued at more than \$250.



More Than Just Milk - By Bree Stalsberg

Every day dairy helps fuel my body, my parents' bank account, and my community. My family relies on dairy more than anything else in the world. Wisconsin is known as Wisconsin's Dairyland. That's why for every meal, I drink milk!

Wisconsin's dairy industry has fueled the lives of my family for generations and still does today! Every night when my family sits down for supper there is an ice cold milk on the table. Drinking milk is very important, it makes your teeth and bones strong. Milk is an excellent source of calcium and twelve essential nutrients. The average dairy cow in Wisconsin produces seven gallons of milk a day. Other dairy products like chocolate milk, cottage cheese, yogurt and cheese are always in our fridge for an easy, healthy snack to fuel my body.

Dairy farmers do business with so many people, even some in my family. My brother milks cows on a local dairy farm. My mom works as a dairy nutritionist, and my dad is an Ag Business instructor. My grandparents have been dairy farmers for nearly 50 years. Every community in Wisconsin benefits from dairy cows. One in nine jobs in Wisconsin relies on dairy farmers. If you think of all the people a dairy farmer can see in a day from the milk truck driver, seed dealer, feed delivery person, cow breeder, nutritionist, veterinarian, to milk equipment company. All those businesses rely on dairy farmers for their jobs and livelihoods. For every dollar generated by dairy farming, it turns three to seven times in the economy. When a farmer is making money, everyone is making money.

Wisconsin's 1.27 million cows help generate over 154,000 jobs and create over a billion dollars in state and local taxes. When a farmer pays all of their employees the employees get money to put into their wallets to buy clothing, food and local products. Spending by others helps fuel the economy. Wisconsin's dairy industry contributes \$45.6 billion to the economy each year. That's a lot of milk!

I can't imagine our world without milk and the very important dairy farmers. My life and others have been sculpted by the hard working dairy farmers who help take care of the cows and produce milk. That's why with every meal, I'm going to drink milk!

You're Gonna Need Milk for That - By Tara Lenzendorf

It takes a lot of work to get dairy products to your fridge. Dairy farmers work day and night to get them to you. Farmers play a very important job in producing dairy products. Wisconsin farming and dairy industries jobs are nearly 12% of the state's employment. Getting milk and dairy products to your table is a lot of work, but it is worth it.

Farmers play a big role in getting dairy products to you. There is way more to it than just milking the cows. First farmers talk to Agronomists about the soil and how they can grow better crops. Cows need quality feed to keep them healthy to produce nutritious milk. The farmers talk to a nutritionist about feed rations. They feed the cows daily and also milk their cows two to three times a day. The milk gets dropped off at the dairy plant. There are many steps for the milk to leave the farm.

Once the milk is off the farm, there are still many steps and jobs. When the milk gets dropped off from the milk truck it goes to a part of the plant where it gets tested. The milk gets tested to see if it's safe for people to drink. Then they homogenize it, they take out percentages of fat. The result is different kinds of milk such as whole milk, 1% and 2%. After dairy creamery workers are done testing the milk it is packaged. Once packaged, it gets

transferred from the dairy plants to where you can purchase it.

You can purchase these dairy products straight from the creameries or from your local grocery stores. At Westby Creamery in Westby, Wisconsin, you can purchase a lot of different dairy products like yogurt, butter, and the most popular thing is cheese. Their cheese is made by local farmers all over Wisconsin. It comes in all different forms including cheese spreads, cottage cheese, and cheese curds which is their most popular seller. Another creamery in Wisconsin is the Shullsburg Creamery, which most likely sells milk and all kinds of cheese. Local dairy products like these can be found all over Wisconsin.

It takes many people to work together to get dairy products from the farm to you. Farmers take a lot of time caring for their animals so they will produce high-quality milk. Plant workers test and process the milk to provide us with safe and healthy dairy products. Store workers stock the shelves with dairy products for you to buy and take home. Dairy products are very important for Wisconsin's economy. Getting dairy products to you takes a lot of hard work, but it is worth it. Wisconsin has been America's Dairyland for almost 100 years and hopefully for many to come.

Promotion and Education Committee Update

It was a busy spring for the Wisconsin Farm Bureau Promotion and Education Committee! On March 17-18, the committee held the Ag LEAD Summit in Fond du Lac. It was broken into four tracks: Leading Your Own Self Development, Engaging Consumers, Advocating for Agriculture and Developing Agribusinesses.

By far my favorite part of the program was the consumer panel put

together by The Center for Food Integrity. Five consumers were interviewed, and their main concerns were environment, sustainability, the onset of puberty at a younger age and chemicals affecting future generations. With the internet and news outlets, they want to know the big picture and what's true. They wanted a collective source with more information from farmers.

We realized consumers were willing to pay more money for good quality food and would like to see "table topper" type of information at the point of purchase for their food. The consumers felt our food system is not sustainable due to factors like hungry children, waste, depletion of resources and climate impacts. They romanticize the family farm because of the

care towards animals, land and families. Hearing from consumers was a great way to gain a better understanding of their differing viewpoints on agriculture.

Some other key takeaways were:

• Chris Hinrichs spoke on Transformational Leadership and how to inspire the best in others. He used the analogy of a chain: "If you push it, you don't know where it will go. But if you pull it, then it will follow you."

Members Attend AFBF FUSION Conference


District 3 YFA Committee Representatives

Members Connect with Legislators at Ag Day at the Capitol

On March 29, more than 250 farmers and agriculturists gathered at the Monona Terrace in Madison for Ag Day at the Capitol. Ag Day at the Capitol is an annual event for Wisconsin farmers and agriculturists to learn more about state issues affecting agriculture and meet with their state legislators.

"We appreciate our members taking time off their farms to speak up on key issues impacting our rural communities," said WFBF Executive Director of Governmental Relations Jason Mugnaini. "The strength of our rural community lies within the voices of our state's farmers and the ability to share their stories with their legislators."

Attendees started the day with Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection Secretary Randy Romanski who served as the event's keynote speaker. Secretary Romanski outlined initiatives impacting agriculture outlined in the 2023-25 biennial state budget, including increasing trade opportunities, investments to the processing industry and connecting the general public with agriculture.

He encouraged farmers and agriculturists to continue to be

strong advocates for Wisconsin's rural communities.

"Events like Ag Day at the Capitol are great because we have the opportunity to talk on common interests," said Sec. Romanski. "I





am appreciative of your efforts and the efforts of our legislators that collectively help us move agriculture forward."

Following the Secretary's speech, the afternoon session was a legislative panel comprised of Senators Howard Marklein and Joan Ballweg, and Representatives Tony Kurtz and Nancy VanderMeer.

- The panel discussed:
- Agriculture's role in developing solutions to protect the food supply and government's role in aiding that protection.
- Pressing issues facing Wisconsin agriculture in the current budget cycle.
- The statewide need for rural road infrastructure improvements.
- Farmer-led conservation initiatives including producerled watershed programming.

The program concluded with issue briefings with a strong focus on farm supply chain protection. Topics included

improvements to local transportation,



labor, animal health and disease prevention, and food distribution and aggregation solutions. Additional issue briefings focused on farmer-led conservation, rural prosperity and the

organization's legislative session priorities.

The afternoon's program concluded with attendees traveling to the Capitol where they met with legislators from their respective areas.


