

Unfinished Business

As we turn the page to 2024, WFBF has some unfinished business that started in 2023.

•The Farm Bill was supposed to be passed by October 1, 2023 and it was extended into 2024. Your organization is continuing to press Congress to update and renew the Title 1 part of this

document to upgrade yields and reference prices for the major grains.

- •On the milk side, we are working to raise the cap on the DMC program to better reflect the average dairy herd in the U.S. and to restore the pricing system back to the higher price of Class III or Class IV which was changed in the 2018 Farm Bill to the average of the 2 prices.
- •We are also pressing the use of monies earmarked for conservation practices to be used to fund the conservation title in the Farm Bill.
- •The Federal Milk Marketing Order (FMMO) hearing process was started late in 2023 and will continue to be focused on by both WFBF and AFBF to update that system for the betterment of dairy farmers. It is a tedious process that we need to monitor into 2024.
- •Within our state legislature, we continue to ask that WFBF can offer a

healthcare plan option to our members by partnering with another state Farm Bureau. This will take a legislative change at the Capitol to offer this plan.

As you can see your Governmental Relations department, as well as your WFBF Board of Directors, will be busy advocating on your behalf, and I hope you were a part of advocating at Ag Day at the Capitol at the end of January.

Another New Year commitment is to appoint members from District 1 to Statewide Committees.

- •Members serving on the dairy committee are Carl Wolf from Washington County and Jeremy Bratz from Racine County. I would like to thank Rick Roden for serving 3 years on that committee and chairing it last year.
- •The two members on the Volunteers for Agriculture® Committee include Ben Harbach from Kenosha County and Gene Mess from Jefferson County.
- •John Scott from Racine County is beginning his second year on the policy development committee.
- •A new appointment this year was for someone to serve on the Wisconsin Farm Bureau Foundation Council. Jim Renn from Waukesha County will represent District 1 and Bob Nash from Ozaukee County will be one of the 3 at-large representatives.

Ag in the Classroom Thriving

Ag in the Classroom is a part of Wisconsin Farm Bureau and Jefferson County Farm Bureau has its own Ag in the Classroom committee. After a few off years during COVID, we are looking to get our membership involved and to have more involvement in local schools. There are a few main things that Ag in the Classroom focuses on throughout the school year. We are looking for volunteers to help with any or all of the following events.

The Jefferson County Ag in the Classroom committee met at Jelli's Market on November 28 and met again at the end of January.

Our main goal is to have volunteers go into elementary classrooms in local schools for 2nd grade students. A lot of teachers are interested in teaching about agriculture but are not knowledgeable about the methods. We need volunteers to go to local 2nd grade classrooms and teach a lesson to students about the importance of agriculture. This is usually done in the spring, but most teachers are flexible about timing. We really want to strengthen this program. It helps to have enough people in different parts of the county visit their local school so that we make a bigger impact. Time is important these days, so if we can get enough volunteers to visit one or two classrooms, it will make a big difference. As far as a timeline, normally we make connections in January with teachers and plan to get into classrooms in March or April. Emails work best if you can get ahold of teachers. The great thing about Ag in the Classroom is that there are lesson plans all made up for you, so all you have to do is get the materials, study it for yourself and then present it. You can put your own spin on the lesson and if you purchase anything to give to students, such as string cheese, you will be reimbursed by Jefferson County Farm Bureau Ag in the Classroom. Lessons shouldn't take more than an hour; we normally work with teachers to determine the best length of time they have during the day.

Essay Contest for 4th and 5th grade students: Another main goal is to have local classrooms of 4th or 5th grade students participate in the Ag in the Classroom essay contest. There is a book of the year determined by the state Ag in the Classroom committee and after reading the book, students can

write a short essay about agriculture and submit it for competition. The local county Ag in the Classroom committee will pick a winner from the county, and then we submit it to the district level for competition. In the past, winners and participating classrooms received a prize such as Walmart gift cards for use in the classroom. We need help spreading the word about the essay contest, which is due to us by April 15. Then we, as a committee, read the essays and pick a winner. It is fun and entertaining to read the essays that students submit. We will meet in late April to determine the winner.

4th grade Farm Tours at Kutz Dairy Farm in Jefferson: The first Wednesday in May, every 4th grade classroom is invited to go to Kutz Dairy Farm and learn about agriculture in a hands-on environment. The Kutz Family spearheads this operation, so their main needs are adult volunteers to help serve lunches, as well as being at different educational stations on the farm.

Career Day for High School Students: Our county Ag in the Classroom committee would like to try something new this year and create a local Career Fair directed at high school students who are interested in agriculture or ag-related business. We hope to partner with local businesses to create a one-day job fair to benefit both local businesses and high school students.

There are TONS of materials available to help us spread the word about the importance of agriculture. We need YOU to help us make a difference. If you are interested in any or all of these things, please contact Lindsay Baneck, Melissa Gross or Ashley Schlender for more information. We also hope to sponsor a teacher from our county to go to the Wisconsin Ag in the Classroom training. If you know a local teacher who would love to learn more about this program, please let us know. We hope to nominate a teacher from a different district every year.

Scholarships Due April 1

Jefferson County Farm Bureau is offering scholarships to both graduating high school seniors and current post-secondary students.

Qualifications: Applicants or their parents must be a current, paid member of Jefferson County Farm Bureau. Upon being selected for a scholarship, the recipient must volunteer with the Farm Bureau at the Jefferson County Fair and provide proof of 2.5 GPA or higher upon completion of the first semester. Over the course of the recipient's post-secondary education, the recipient may be awarded two scholarships from the Jefferson County Farm Bureau.

The completed application form along with a 250-word essay, two letters of recommendation and a copy of your current grade transcript is due by April 1.

In December the Board of Directors adopted a family of three from the Fort Atkinson area through the Jefferson County Christmas Neighbors program. Gifts were purchased for the kids as well as the adults. All the fixings for a holiday meal were also provided.

In 1952, a gentleman by the name of Clarence "Pop" Wendt worked as a Probation Officer in Jefferson County, Wisconsin. Sadly, his job took him into a great deal of homes where far too many children would go without Christmas gifts and other necessities because of their families' hardships.

Pop made it his mission to change that for as many children as he possibly could! He orchestrated his first toy drive by contacting the Jefferson County Social Service workers. They helped him collect and distribute toys for as many children as their funds would allow.

Initially, this program was known as "The Pop Wendt Program". While the goal is the same, more than 60 years later, Pop Wendt's mission is now carried on as the Jefferson County Christmas Neighbors. Each holiday season, they serve hundreds of families and nearly 2,000 children throughout communities in the Jefferson County area!


Washington County Farm Bureau Membership Chair

Former Waukesha Board Member Wins Distinguished Service to Farm Bureau Award

Rob Klussendorf was presented with the WFBF Distinguished Service

to Farm Bureau award during the WFBF Annual Meeting on December 3.

Klussendorf's involvement with Farm Bureau began in 1968 when he attended a Waukesha Farm Bureau meeting where former WFBF Director of Special Programs Don Armitage said, "If you do not like what is going on and don't do anything about it, don't complain."

"That statement set the stage for the rest of his life, if there is something that needs to be done or changed to better Wisconsin farmers, Rob gets involved," said Taylor County Farm Bureau Vice President Gary Kohn.

Rob's dedicated service to Farm Bureau started with the Waukesha County Young Farmer Committee where he served as chairman from 1975-1978. Rob was then

nominated and chosen to serve his district on the WFBF State Young Farmer Committee in 1977-1980 and was elected as chair from 1979-1980.

Rob continued his Farm Bureau service as a Waukesha County Farm Bureau

d Service board member from 1978-2012 where he served on several WFBF committees including a special committee on Young Farmer Finance, Policy Development Committee, Legislative Committee, VFA Committee, Ag in the Classroom Committee, Communication

Committee and was the chair of the Tax and Education Committee.

Rob also helped create the Farmer in the

Rob also helped create the Farmer in the Classroom program which went on to be adopted by WFBF to become the statewide Ag in the Classroom program.

"Rob is the member that makes things happen instead of waiting for them to happen," Kohn said. "Rob's grandfather, Fred, was the first person to sign the Waukesha Farm Bureau charter, making the Klussendorf family the first members in the state. To Rob, Farm Bureau isn't just a group of farmers, it's family."

Rob and his wife, Chris, now live in Medford

and enjoy spending time with their daughter, son and grandkids, but their roots run deep in Waukesha County.
