The kids enjoyed playing in the corn pools with toy tractors, trying their luck on duck races, coloring agriculture pictures for the children at Wisconsin Children's and free hot chocolate. which drew in a good crowd for watching and dancing. The mac and cheese bar was a hit with so many delicious toppings to choose from.
